

Bahá'í Office for Social and Economic Development All you need is one person – a BOSED project in Bradford-on-Avon

ON APRIL 8, 2002 the Universal House of Justice sent an email to the Bahá'í Office for Social and Economic Development (BOSED) praising a Bahá'í from Bradford-on-Avon for her efforts in initiating a Tranquillity Zone as part of a probation programme for juvenile drug offenders in Trowbridge. The Universal House of Justice especially emphasised the demand by participants, the staff and local government for this spiritual component of the probation programme.

The Tranquillity Zone (TZ) is part of a pilot programme run by the Trowbridge Probation Service to try and cut down on drug addicts' reoffending. Out of several pilot projects in the country, the one in Trowbridge is very successful (with fewer people re-offending). The project gives young drug offenders (heroin users) the opportunity of either attending this programme or going to prison. The programme also includes counselling (group and individual), medical attention, literacy lessons, storytelling, shiatsu massage, and art and colour therapy.

The Bahá'í and a friend are part of the Probation team and have been allocated a special room to set up the Tranquillity Zone every week. Currently 20 offenders attend the TZ, sometimes joined by the counsellor, probation and social workers, and a general practitioner. The number of clients will soon increase to 40 as fewer clients are re-offending and new ones are starting the programme. In future, the Service hopes to use this room to end each day with a meditation (10 minutes).

Local government has provided cushions, candles, vases and a tape/CD player. A special portable tent is also used. The aim of the TZ is to create a beautiful, loving space that feeds the senses and feels very safe and nurturing. For some of these young adults it might be the first time they have experienced real unconditional tender loving care just because they are considered special. It is not possible to use the word "God" in the readings, because the Service is very sensitive to any sort of religious persuasion. However, Bahá'í writings are used in tiny amounts. Clients are taken on a meditative journey with music, stories and quotations.

The theme for the first few weeks was "Being a mine of inestimable gems", while the theme for the next 9 weeks will be "Shining your light". Each session lasts for 45 minutes. At the end of it, each client receives a card with a quote and a shiny gem sticker backing up the story to take home. They also have a small assignment for the week that is about giving to others or shining their light in some way. Often new clients are quite disturbed when they participate in the sessions, but after a while they settle down and really relax. The organiser is still amazed that they can settle for so long. Clients say that they really like the atmosphere, the cushions, the flowers and the feeling in the room. Some of them have been taking flowers home to give to family or friends, thus indicating that they start to think of

others as well.

The Bahá'í running the project is inspired by the words of Bahá'u'lláh:

"Every word that proceedeth out of the mouth of God is endowed with such potency as

can instill new life into every human frame, if ye be of them that comprehend this truth." (Bahá'u'lláh: Gleanings, p. 141, UK Ed.)

She therefore trusts that the few words of Bahá'u'lláh that they receive each week, reach deep into their subconscious and must have an effect, however small. During the musical parts, she also silently says the healing prayer for them.

The probation officers send regular reports to the Home Office and all courts in Trowbridge are aware that this Tranquillity Zone is a Bahá'í project. She has also been invited to a special day session with 12 members of the probation team. Two of the team plan to attend the Empowerment Training programme in Swindon. The future aim is to train local social workers to continue the project.

The Bahá'í project founder continues to try out new materials and she's willing to share these materials with friends who'd like to initiate similar programmes in prisons or elsewhere. She says that the one important thing this project has taught her is that only one person is needed to initiate an inspiring project.
