ASSEMBLY NEWS Room 312 Central Building Public Invited Every Friday Evening

On last Friday it was the good fortune of all who attended to hear a very illuminating address by Miss A. Glenn of Seattle from the subject "A New Call to Old Ideas." Miss Glenn is an active and makes a splendid representative of the teachings of the brotherhood of man. Miss Glenn explained some of the principles of the philosophy and told how the nine leading teachers of religion have appeared in the different ages and instructed the people in the language which the people could best understand and which was adapted to their respective civilizations. "When Christ made his advent and gave his law of love, the people of that time had advanced in powers of perception and therefore an eye for an eye and a tooth for a tooth were no more," she said, and added: "Baha O'liah and Abdul Baha taught the people in accordance with their present day powers of perception."

Miss Glenn said, in speaking of

their departure from the world. Mrs. Glenn said: "They leave physically but leave a renewal of the age-old ideals or principles of Godlike perfection." The philosophy will erase all boundaries, she said, not only of states but of nations, as the spirit of the age is stealing over them unawares. The speaker said that many are clinging to their old traditions and missing the beautiful spirit of the age while others are enjoying it. Heretofore we have not recognized the oneness of humanity but we have now; we have learned that we are really not only a part of each other but are really each other, and whatever we do to each other, we are doing to ourselves." She compared the revelation to the diamond and said that as the diamond possessed all the colors, yet it becomes a perfect white stone, so the religion represents a blending—a universalizing of all religions into a perfect one.

NOTED PULPIT ORATOR COM-PARES GARVEY WITH ST. PAUL

(Continued from page 1) the kingdom of Israel. It was no more a crime against civilized society for Garvey to be proclaimed the spiritual head of an African state than it was for Christ to declare Himself King in Caesar's empire. It was no more a crime for Garvey's business to fall than it was for the business of any other individual or corporation to fail while doing its best to survive. The career of Garvey no more deserves a federal prison than the life of Christ deserved the crucifixion on Calvary. If equitable justice is denied Garvey, America is made less safe for democracy in general and the black race in particular everywhere. When public sentiment silences the humblest Negro's cry for freedom and equality of opportunity, the whitest country servants and patriots of the public dare not speak their highest and holiest thoughts or vote their convictions."

The preacher then quoted at length from a book of his own and from several noted works of white men showing that the oppression of the black man in Africa was a blot upon civilization and was contrary to God's will, and that God in his own time would solve the problem. Africa must be redeemed, and sooner or later Garvey's idea must be carried out. It was the duty of every Negro, man or woman, in these United States to raise his or her voice in loud protest against the incarceration of Marcus Garvey and not cease clamoring and protesting until he was released.
