LEAD MOVEMENT TO BUILD \$30,000 HOME FOR AGED NEGROES IN THE NORTHWEST SPOKANE, Wash., March 3.—Construction of a home for aged and

helpless negroes of Washington, Idaho, Montana and Oregon will be started here in the spring. Cost of the building will be about \$30,000. Announcement of the project was made today by Miss Lucretia Harris Gray, president of the Washington-Harris Nonsectarian Home association, and W. B. Edmonson, secretary. A tract of land consisting of 11 acres on the Biglow Gulch road, about two miles beyond Hillyard, has been acquired by the association for the purpose, Miss Gray announced. The building will be constructed in two wings. It is planned to have the first wing completed and ready for use by next fall. The Rev. J. W. Anderson, financial secretary of Portland, Ore., will arrive in the city tomorrow to interest the colored population of the city in the project. He will speak at the

Calvary Baptist church Wednesday, Thursday and Friday nights. Plans for the building will be virtually completed during the Rev. Anderson's stay in the city.—Spokane Daily Chronicle. Vickrey, General Secretary of the Near East Relief, made public a letter from Mr. John H. (Jack) Coogan, Jackie's father, giving his consent to the trip.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Coogan are to accompany Jackie on his trip to the Near East and all expenses will be paid by them. It is estimated that about ten weeks will be required for the campaign and the return trip to the near eastern countries to be visited.
