### WHAT GARVEY SAID

Mr. Garvey, who wears as fine robes as any English lord chancellor and intends to lead the colored people to liberty and a republic in Liberia, says to his followers: You are entitled to anything that

anybody else has. That isn't true. Each man is en-

titled to what he can achieve. White people have fought and been killed for many thousands of years in the process of getting what they have

But all people, and especially the Negro race brought to this country by slave traders against their will, are entitled to justice and full opportunity. And that is all that is demanded by intelligent men and women, both black and white.

We clipped the above from the pen of that far-famed writer, Arthur Brisbane, writing in the San Francisco Examiner. Mr. Brisbane, to doubt, expressed the feeling of a large number of the white race towards the rights and privileges of the colored

Mr. Brisbane is, according to every rule of justice, radically wrong, while Mr. Garvey is indisputably right when he says that the colored race is entitled to everything that anybody else has. Mr. Brisbane says the white people have fought and been killed for many thousands of years in the process of attaining his present position in the world. So has the colored man fought and died for democracy that he hasn't got and from all indications he has to keep on fighting for a long time before he

### COLORED HELP DISCHARGED

It is nothing new here as well as elsewhere to hear of colored employes being put out of places where they have given general satisfaction for many years. However, there is a reason. The white employer knows that there are hundreds of his people out of work and he receives daily many requests for work. Finally he relents to public clamor and public demand, and unwillingly colored help is discharged. Sad as it may sound, every race on the face of the earth except the American colored race has pooled its money and established business institutions where many of their own people are given employment. And until the American colored race quits depending on the white man's sympathy and the white man's charity for assistance, it will always be tramping around from pillar to post, never getting anywhere, looking for jobs and abusing the white man because he won't employ

#### PORTLAND TELEGRAM SOWS SEEDS OF RACE PREJUDICE

The Portland Telegram is proving to be one of the worst enemies of our race by sowing seeds of race prejudice in the Northwest. Seldom does it make a respectable reference to colored people. Our women are called 'negresses' and too often our men are referred to as brutes. Here is a sample: Last week a colored man was warned in a letter to leave a certain small town in Oregon or suffer the consequences. The Telegram came out in box car letters clear across the front page of that edition: "Negro intimidated, flees town", while in the same issue in an obscure place with a small head line the following atrocious crime was told:

Father Convicted on Girl's Charge Edward L. Brashears, who served only a few days of a five-year sentence on a manslaughter charge in 1922 before being paroled, was found guilty in Judge Tucker's court this afternoon on a statutory charge involving his own 14-year-old daughter. The crime carries a punishment of from twenty years' imprisonment to life. He will be sentenced Friday


