From the New York of the North, to the New York of the South, Marcus Garvey has come. The contrast between purple robes of regal splendor, his former apparel, and the plain black and white cotton prison garb, his future raiment, add the final touch of the tragedy.

Arrested On Train

The law, moving slowly, but inexorably, placed its clawing clutches on Garvey in New York last Thursday night as he was entering the city from Detroit. His conviction on a charge of using the mails to defraud, was recently upheld by the New York Court of Appeals.

The train was held until Deputy United States Marshals James Hyer render. and Walter Carr found Garvey seated beside his wife. They informed him they had come to arrest him on a bench warrant signed by Federal Judge A. N. Hand for his failure to appear in court at 10 a. m., Wednesday, in accordance with his attorney's promise.
