Dead Man's Crime Was Buying Cotton. Will And Papers Destroyed By Whites Who Owed Him Thousands

St. Matthews, S. C. Oct. 15—"Pink" Whaley, wealthy farmer, was lynched by a mob here recently because he insisted on buying coton at a rate one-half cent a pound more than the whites had established These are facts established by a special representative of the Afro American, sent here to investigate the lynching.

Whites had established the price of cotton and Whaley had ignored their price, therfore the lynching.

Feared Trouble

The night of the murder, Whaley said to his sister, Miss Blondell Whaley, a teacher in one of the private schools not far away. "I am going out to watch the cotton. I am afraid it will be destroyed."

She was ready to retire when she heard a shot, shortly thereafter receiving word that the victim was her brother. Mrs. Whaley, wife of the dead man, has one chid and expects another within three months.

Sister Defies Mob

Miss Whaley drew on a kimona and for two hours stood over her brother's body, defying the mob. Some shouted to shoot her, but she stood her ground. A doctor in the neighborhood approached her, but she thrust him aside, daring him to touch the
