From his cell in Atlanta Penitentiary, where he is serving a term for using the mails to defraud, Prsident General Garvey has issued proclamation charging Acting Pre-ident General William Sherrill and other high officials with dsloyalty, and calling an international conven-tion of the Negroes of the world to be held in Detroit from March 14 to 31

"There is urgent necessity for a change in the present administration of the U. N. I. A. and its auxilliaries, and this convention will, among other things, elect officers so as to insure the successful carrying forward of the work so ably begun and fostered by our great leader," the call states.

National Association for the Advancement of Colored People has received a report from Robert W.
Bagnall, its Director of Branches, concerning a meeting he addressed in Akron, Ohio, attended by a group of Kt. Klux Klansmen. Mr. Bagnall reports as follows:

"When we got to the church (colored Baptist) there we found a body of 250 hard-looking whites sitting compactly together in a group, and about 25 colored people sitting on the side. These last afterwards increased to about 70 and 4 of 5 colored people came in and sat in the midst of the white group.

"When a soloist sang very creditably the whites applauded not a bit but sat grim and ugly. When the collection was taken, they gave nothing

Regardless of color, race and size, nations are admitted to the League of Nations on terms of equality.

Under the present law, an alien may be deported if he is found to be a bad man within five years after his entry. The new bill takes away this time limit and he may he is "undesirable". One of the offenses which makes him deportable is conviction of an offense for which a prison term of one year or more is imposed. Also he can be deported if he becomes a public charge from causes not affirmatively shown to have arisen subsequent to entry into bad on the content of th escaping from the fact, unpalatable as it may be to the white races, that in international government the future of the world rests with the colored races."
