NEGRO ON WALL STR.

There are many prominent streets in the commercial districts of great American cities that are virtually closed to business men of the Negro race. At last, however it seems Negro business men are about to add color to one of the greatest of those streets—Wall Street—the great money market of the world.

The conference was a significant one, and according to reports, will ultimately in far-reaching benefits to the business interests of the race. It was the first time on record that such a large and representative group of financiers of both races in the United States ever came together in a conference of this kind.

LEAVING THE SOUTH The white South is greatly alarmed over the large number of colored people who are leaving their southern homes for the north. And the question is being asked by some, why? The answer is plain to all those who have kept informed on conditions as effecting the colored people in the south.

Probably the greatest, the most powerful single group of men in America is the dedicated to the Christian ministry. It is stimulating to contemplate the tremendous results which would come from their aggressive leadership if only they launched a united, consistent program the interest of racial justice and welfare.
