MILITANTS ATTACK DOCTORS.

Smash Windows in Protest Against Forcible Feeding.

LONDON, Oct. 10.—The service in Westminster Abbey this afternon was interrupted by seven women who at the conclusion of the third Collect began to chant: "God save Mary Richardson and Jane Short! They are being forcibly fed in prison!" They repeated this three times, when two vergers reached them and escorted them to the door.

Early this morning the windows in the houses of several West End physicians were broken by suffragettes as a protest against forcible feeding in the Holloway Prison. One of the principal victims was Sir Thomas Barlow, the King's physician, who had three windows smashed.

MILITANTS HURTING CAUSE.

Mrs. Nathan Thinks Suffrage Is Further Off in England.

Arriving on the Cunarder Lusitania yesterday was Mrs. Frederick Nathan the suffrage leader who has been abroad for the Summer attending various conventions and congresses in Europe. At Budapest she attended the International Congress of Women's Clubs at which twenty-seven nationalities were represented, she said. Afterward Mrs. Nathan went to The Hague to attend the Peace Conference where she presented a flag sent by the Daughters of the American Revolution.

When asked about suffrage in England Mrs. Nathan replied that she was not a militant and thought that the English women were further away from their goal now than they were two years ago, and all because of the militant methods that had been used there.

PROPHET PRAISES CARNEGIE

In Persian Coloring Abdul Baha Abbas Sends Him a Message.

Praise for Andrew Carnegie in the poetic prose of a Persian prophet is contained in a letter received yesterday by Tapakeyan Kahn, Persian Consul General in New York. The letter was written in Egypt by Abdul Baha Abbas, the aged prophet of the Bahai creed. Who visited this country last year to

advocate universal peace and to say farewell to his followers upon this earth.

Abdul Baha Abbas was entertained while here by the 100-odd members of the New York Bahai Society. He spoke of the world peace movement at a religious service in the Church of the Ascension, and declared his faith in the final unification of all religions at the Lake Mohawk conference for 1912. His message of praise sent here for Mr. Carnegie is on account of the work of the Carnegie Peace Foundation.

"O thou respected and beloved personage." he writes in addressing the Persian Consul General, "convey on my behalf the utmost kindness to the respected lady, thy revered wife. I continually pray in her behalf and beg divine protection and preservation. Kiss also the two cheeks of thy beloved child on my behalf.

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
