PHYLLIS CHEW is a Singaporean who became a member of the Bahá'í Faith in 1984. She is a linguist by profession and is a senior lecturer of pragmatics and socio-linguistics at the National University of Singapore. She was the co-ordinating Secretary for the First World Religion Day held in Singapore in 1995 and Chairperson for the Second World Religion Day in 1996. Her other area of interest is in gender studies and she is currently President of the Association of Women for Action and Research (AWARE) and was President of the University Women's Association in 1998. Dr Phyllis Chew is the author of the book "Chinese Religion and the Bahá'í Faith" (Oxford, George Ronald, 1993).

ANJAM KHURSHEED was born in Pakistan and grew up in Scotland where he received all his schooling and university education. By training, he is an applied physicist, and is at present, an Associate Professor at the National University of Singapore. In 1976, he became a member of the Bahá'í Faith. Apart from his international publications and patent applications as a professional scientist, Professor Khursheed is the author of three books that reflect his interest in the philosophy of science, religion and mind.

She has been a freelance writer and editor in Singapore for a period of about 6 years, and is currently the owner and manager of the book company, "Bookaburra".
