


Some Recollections of Ewa and the Members of the Ewa Bahá'í **Community in** the 1960s






Ewa's First Bahá'í in






Photograph taken behind the Augur's home on Beretania St. (not far from Iolani Palace) on December 10, 1909.

More than half of the ladies shown in the photograph became members of the first Bahá'í Assembly of Hawaii in 1910. Ms Johnson was beloved by all. She taught the Pires sisters, Meta Sutherland (buried very near Martha Root) and Adeline White, who met 'Abdu'l-Bahá in California.

Abbey Frances received two Tablets from 'Abdu'l-Bahá.



Photograph taken between 1918 and 1921. The Augurs returned from Japan in Dec. 1917 and Ms Johnson died in 1921.




The house was acquired in 1960 after the sale of the Bahá'í Center on the Ala Wai Canal (1941-1960).



Bahá'í).





Master.


Her stories of 'Abdu'l-Bahá, the Greatest Holy Leaf and the history of the Faith in America brought the past very near to us new Bahá'ís.








Hand of the Cause Bill Sears and his wife Marguerite visited Hawaii a number of times during the 1960s. I recall in particular his visit in March, 1964 because I was able to talk with him as were other members of the Ewa community.



On Friday, November 22, 1963, the President—John F. Kennedy— was assassinated in Dallas, TX. That same weekend many Bahá'ís of O'ahu went to the grave of Martha Root to pray for JFK's soul.












Miss Alexander with the members of the newly-elected NSA of the Hawaiian Islands

Captain Lawrence Kelly, USN

The first meeting of the LSA of Ewa took place in the home of Larry & Florence Kelly on the Pearl Harbor base. Larry was later captain of the real "Love Boat" that sailed between the islands.



Donald Alread

All I recall is that Don was in the service. I have heard (not confirmed) that he died some years ago.



Susan DeSena

The home of Joe & Sue was one of the two most active teaching sites in Ewa in the early 1960s. (The other home was Jack & Grace Smith's.) Sue's gracious hospitality and cool, calm demeanor made all feel welcomed and warmed.



Duane Troxel

Duane would later serve again on the LSA of Ewa in 1979 and 1980. He & Stephanie were homefront pioneers in Pahala, Ka'u on the Big Island from 1972-1974.



Philip Lemon

Phil later pione@red to Australia with his wife Jenny, who became editor of Herald of the South. Phil & Jenny have remained in Australia where they raised their two children.

Joe DeSena

The home of Joe & Sue was a welcome refuge for many young servicemen & women in the early 50s. Joe was a great father figure and a warm and understanding friend. Agnes Alexander paid a visit to the DeSena home to meet with us youth. Joe passed to the Abhá Kingdom many years ago.

Tyshon (Clark) Davis

Tysh was in the USN when she was elected to Ewa's LSA. She later pioneered to the Philippines. After returning to Hawaii she became estranged from the Faith. It is believed she still lives on O'ahu.

Florence (loas) Kelly

Florence is from one of the most distinguished Bahá'í families in America— the loas family.

Florence is one of Hawai'is four living Knights of Bahá'u'lláh for her pioneering to Monaco during the 10 Year World Crusade.

She & her husband Larry have remained in Hawai'i since 1954.


Jack Smith

The second Ewa home that was a hotbed of Bahá'í youth activities in the early 1950s was that of lack & Grace Smith. As in the DeSena home, it sometimes seemed there were more youth than room to hold them!

Jack, like Joe DeSena was a superb in ther figure whose sage advice resolved a number of crises in the community. Jack was the first member of the Ewa community to be elected to the NSA of Hawai'i.




Jack was present at the Fire in the Pacific conference in December 2001.

First Bahá'í of Ewa

Abbey Frances Johnson of Ewa was not only the first Bahá'í of Ewa, she was the first and only Bahá'í of Ewa to receive a Tablet from 'Abdu'l-Bahá and she was the first from Ewa to serve on a Bahá'í Assembly & host a feast in Ewa.

First NSA Member

Jack Smith was the first resident of Ewa to be elected to the NSA of Hawaii.



First Continental Board of Counsellors Member

Ben Ayala of Ewa was Continental Board of Counsellors Member from 1980 to 2000.
